BILL SUMMARY

Synopsis:

HB 334 provides for the regulation, production testing, manufacturing and transport of cannabis and cannabis products for research purposes.

Creates the cannabis control division.

Creates exemptions from prosecution under the controlled substances act (Schedule I).

SIGNIFICANT ISSUES

The pertinent part of HB 334 that will affect district attorneys is contained on page 20, lines 9-17. This adds a new paragraph (§30-31-6 E (6)), which will exempt marijuana, THC, etc., as controlled substances enumerated in Schedule I and exempts persons who may be cultivating, transporting, testing, manufacturing etc., from prosecution, provided that the above activities are in furtherance of research pursuant to this Act.

CONFLICT, DUPLICATION, COMPANIONSHIP, RELATIONSHIP

There may be a conflict with SB 115 and HB 160 if they pass. Specifically, SB 115 and HB 160 delete marijuana and associated substances from Schedule I (see pages 145, 147 and 148). HB 334 leaves them in Schedule I but adds a provision that exempts marijuana and associated substances provided they are for research as approved by the division.
